Glossary:

¹sleigh — an open vehicle made of wood that is generally pulled by horses and is used especially for transporting people over snow or ice.

²drifted — If snow is *drifted*, it turns into a hill of snow because of the wind.

³to sting — If something *stings*, it causes a sharp pain.

⁴field — a large piece of open land.

⁵dapple-gray — a gray horse with darker gray spots on it.

⁶to spring — If a horse *springs*, it jumps to the front to run more quickly.

⁷hunting hound — a dog used to look for animals in order to catch or kill them.

⁸to spy — Here, *spy* = see.
