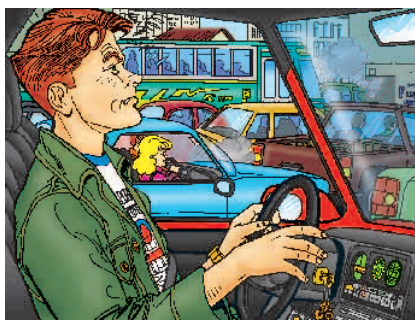

Keep this in mind.



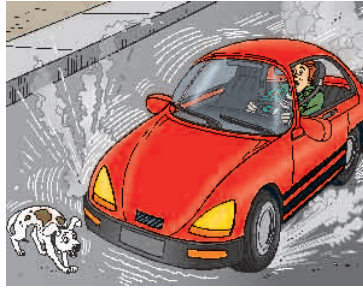
When you are **fed up** with something, you are tired of it and a little angry because it keeps happening or it has been happening for a long time.

Here are some other examples with **fed up with**:

Aren't you **fed up with** working at the same place for so many years?

I'm getting **fed up with** the weather. It's been raining for weeks.

The boy finally turned off onto another street to get away from the traffic. But he started driving too fast. Let's see what happened.



He almost ran over a dog.

Keep this in mind.



If you **run over** a person, animal or thing, you hit and injure them while you're driving.

Take a look at some other examples with **run over**.

Doug almost got **run over** crossing the street. The people in this town drive too fast.

I accidentally **ran over** a little boy today. Luckily, he's going to be OK.
